

Amilcar Cabral is now widely recognised, throughout the world, as one of modern Africa's most outstanding and effective leaders. First, as a thinker and theoretician of political and social change; secondly as a man of action. This reputation he has gained, in his own land as in others, through years of hard and dangerous work as the founder and chief organiser of anti-colonial liberation struggle in the West Africa colony of "Portuguese" Guinea.

Hated by fascist Portugal, feared by apartheid South Africa, Cabral stands at the centre of Africa's present challenge to racism, neo-colonialism, and other threats to black development and freedom. The agents of those who hate him, because they fear his sincerity and self-sacrificing courage, have often tried to kill him. When Portugal mounted an invasion of the Republic of Guinea in November 1970, one of its objects was to reach the Conakry liaison office of the PAIGC (the liberation movement led by Cabral in "Portuguese" Guinea next-door) and murder Cabral himself.

Cabral comes to Britain so that new friendships can be made, new alliances can be forged, new discussions can be held for a struggle for liberation which is white as well as black; which is ours as well as Africa's.
